





2015 Annual Report

ANNUAL CELEBRATION

Seeking a way to better connect our donors, community stakeholders, and community achievements, HCCF started a new tradition: an Annual Celebration. As the name suggests, it was far from an annual meeting around a board room. The inaugural event was held at Port Austin Kayak, a business owned by Trustee Chris Boyle. It featured food and drink from MJ's Kupcakery, The Wooded Island, The Farm, Captain John's, The Green Clean Bean, Dizzy Daisy Winery, and Bird Creek Farms.

Over 100 community stakeholders gathered for the evening. After informal networking, the program for the evening began. Executive Director, Mackenzie Price, provided an overview of the year in a "State of the Foundation" style address. Following Price was Randy Maiers, President and CEO of the Community Foundation for St. Clair County, who updated the audience on the ever changing role of the community foundations across the state of Michigan. The highlight of the evening were the ICE Grant presenters. The Innovative Community Enhancement Grants, discussed earlier in the report, were unveiled at the event and each proposal was given one minute to sell the audience of their project. At the conclusion of the elevator pitches, Price opened Facebook voting for the ICE Grants.

"The evening was a raving success, allowing us to share our message and thank our supporters on a much larger scale." said Price of the evening. "We look forward to continuing this tradition in years to come."

FALL GRANTS

STEM Education and Placemaking were at the forefront of the Huron County Community Foundation (HCCF) Grant awards during their Fall 2015 Grant Cycle. Over \$12,000 was awarded to local projects this week as the grant award winners were announced.

HCCF published their strategic priorities last year after many community conversations and surveys. They continue to use those priorities to focus their grant funding. This year, many of the applicants impacted two strategic priority areas: STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Education and Placemaking, creating public spaces where people want to gather.

With the help of an HCCF Grant, a new MSU Extension program will be coming to Huron County. Thumb Dairy Odyssey, a program designed to increase knowledge around the field of dairy operations and showcase career opportunities in the field, will offer hands on learning opportunities for children ages 9-19. "This is the only program that focuses on Dairy exploration in the Thumb Area. Dairy operations are a large part of Huron County's history and future. We hope this program sparks an interest in area youth to pursue STEM careers and return to continue the legacy of these farms." said HCCF Executive Director, Mackenzie Price, of the project.

The largest placemaking project funded in the Fall 2015 Grant Cycle was the Bad Axe Little League Concession Stand Project. With a total project cost of \$90,000, Bad Axe Little League had begun the process of soliciting funding from community members and local businesses before approaching HCCF for a grant. "This concession stand is a staple of spring and summer recreation for all of the teams in the county who utilizes the Bad Axe Little League Fields. The community has already begun to support this project, so we were happy to join the effort." Price noted.





YAC

The Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) had a fun filled year, with community service projects, proactive grantmaking, and teambuilding with students from across the county.

The YAC examined their Needs Assessment, performed in 2014, and noticed that the top two areas of concern for our county's middle and high school students were drug and alcohol use and abuse. To combat this issue, the YAC took a proactive approach, seeking out organizations they thought would have an impact on the issue. Two grants were awarded: Everyone 4 Prevention and the Huron County Hockey Association. Everyone 4 Prevention is a program of the Huron County Health Department that gets youth involved in substance abuse prevention education and programming. The YAC agreed that this program was a unique way to target their peers with information. The second grant went to the Huron County Hockey Association. As they looked over the Needs Assessment, the YAC considered that a lack of access to constructive activities could be partially causing the increase in concern and exposure to drug and alcohol use. This is where the Huron County Hockey Association came in to play. The YAC awarded the Hockey Association a grant to use as scholarships for players who couldn't otherwise afford to join a hockey team. It is the YAC's hope that this constructive alternative will continue to encourage their peers to be active, driving them away from destructive decisions.

In cooperation with the Huron County Department of Human Services, the YAC connected their elementary schoolmates with senior citizens in their community service project this year. The YAC students engaged kindergarten and first grade classrooms in coloring contests and card marking, then scheduled a day with their local nursing home to deliver the masterpieces and visit with residents. YAC students went to three different nursing homes during the course of the week and delivered over 200 colored pages to residents while also participating in the activity of the day, including bingo and card games.







2015 brought new funds, which means new ways to impact Huron County. One of these new funds is the **Pigeon Community Fund**, a fund that will in perpetuity support projects and organizations impacting the greater Pigeon area. This community fund is led by a committee of people who care about the area: Dwight Gascho (chairman), Chris Wurst, Susan Meyerseick, Jeff Leipprandt, Don Faupel, and HCCF Board Member, Mike LePage. This fund is the first of its kind in the Thumb area and allows individuals to give knowing their contributions will be used to support Pigeon in the years to come.
